

Roy H. Binkley, 89, of Goodlettsville, TN went to his eternal home with the Lord on August 2021. He was born one of 12 children on October 5, 1931 in Robertson County to his parents, the late Jesse Roy and Mary Helen Moulton Binkley. He had a knack for improving productivity with a common sensical style and was highly regarded for his engineering instincts, leadership, ingenuity, and reliable spirit of excellence.

Roy had a masterful mind for designing or building just about anything mechanical in nature. Give him a manual and a set of tools, and he could fix or probably figure out how to make anything better. One of his most enjoyable hobbies was being one of the best-known engine builders at the Nashville Speedway. Over a span of several decades, his engines broke track records and won track championships for his brother, Charlie, and his son, Roy.

He was not one who could sit still and embraced life to the fullest. You could typically find him doing any number of things, but his goal was to always stay busy. He loved spending time tinkering on engines, tackling projects around the house, working in his garden, playing a few musical instruments, or debating politics; but he was happiest when spending time with his family. He was a true family man.

At the core of Roy's life was a quiet appreciation and gratitude to his Lord and Savior for all of what he had, what he was blessed to be a part of and what he is now leaving behind. He left his mark on many and will be deeply missed by all who knew him, but mostly by the family that he loved immeasurably. He is now hearing those words, "Well done, thy good and faithful servant!"
